#### A Word from the Rabbi

Thanks to everybody for making a beautiful Shavuot this year. I especially want to thank Barbara Caplan for coming through on three dairy cheesecakes this year. She was delighted to be in a dairy kitchen at Tree of Life after years in the dairy desert at the Old New Light!

Eating cheesecake is caught up in the sweetness of Revelation which we celebrate at this time of year. Our ancestors were waiting for the commandments to be given the morning of the 6th of Sivan. They wanted to put on the full spread. They did not have the rules for slaughtering a delicious animal for the festive day yet they wanted something festive. Dairy foods would have to do and if you add a little honey, a little sweetness, who knows what you can produce? So was born the cheesecake for Shavuot.

Our holiday celebrates God's revelation which consists of a dual character. First is the idea that God was present to the Jewish people at Mt. Sinai. The content would have no significance had it not been for the fact that God Himself spoke: "Moses spoke and God answered Him with a sound" (Exodus 19:19). A revelation devoid of literary content would still have been of incredible religious significance, in and in itself, as a rendezvous between man and God but there was more. Second, the Giving of the Torah read from Chapter Nineteen of Exodus on the first day of Shavuot tells us that Revelation had a message: the Torah. Beginning with the Ten Commandments, the people assent to these heavenly words by saying "All the words that God has spoken we will do" (Exodus 24:3).

This dual character of revelation formed the central readings for the holiday beginning with the Torah reading from Exodus 19 and then the mysterious vision of Ezekial 1 which expresses that God was present to the Prophet in a vision even without discreet words and letters. The nature of revelation is something debated in Jewish belief to this very day. Is God's presence in our lives enough for us to lead lives of goodness or do we need the testimony of the Torah that tells us that God's presence expects something specific from us, namely loyalty to the commandments? You can see this dual character of Jewish belief threaded through our prayers. May we continue to hold on to ancestral beliefs and discover our own relationship to God through them.
