A Word from the Rabbi

J.J. Goldberg recently wrote a book review for the New York Times in which he states: "As discouraging as these times may be for fans of liberal democracy, the mood among liberal friends of Israel - including most American Jews - is more like severe heartbreak. Look one way and there's Israel's right wing carousing with European despots and Holocaust deniers while fanning racism at home. Look the other way and see the cream of the intersectional left cavorting with the reactionary bigot Louis Farrakhan while young rock-star progressives in Congress set about rebranding the Jewish state from ally into enemy and its supporters - meaning, again, most American Jews - into traitors."

You just cannot seem to win in trying to cheer on Israel in these troubled times. While America is gradually turning into an illiberal democracy with an autocrat at its head, the rest of the world is following suit including a fifth term for "King Bibi." I am in Israel now and I hate to bring up politics with any of our friends and hosts. There was a time when loving the Jewish State came easily to both liberals and conservatives. How do you talk about Israel today? I don't want to get into bed with Donald Trump yet here he is being praised as the greatest friend Israel has ever had. He has moved the US embassy to Jerusalem and recognized the Golan Heights as annexed territory - both moves I have always agreed should happen - yet I know the politics behind it and it makes me sick to my stomach. The Democratic Party cannot even get behind a positive statement on Israel and the Jews (substituting a bland statement on bigotry in general) and the insubordinate left on the party has accused American Jews with dual loyalty. In these times, I try to talk around politics and point out the success story of Israel, the only democracy in the Middle East (so far) and an entrepreneur supreme in electronics, medicine, cheap electricity, irrigation, religion, film and TV and lots of inventions.

This month we celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut (Independence Day), Thursday, May 9th. I always think of celebrating the Miracle on the Mediterranean and the State at its birth. It is more than just a civil holiday for me. I like going to shul to sing Hallel in the morning prayers. I always eat shwarma at the JCC. I understand that the Federation is lining up Israeli star David Broza to sing in concert on May 23rd. There are churches who celebrate with big musical programs. I look forward to visiting with the disabled Israeli vets (always a favorite to-do project for Dan Stein, alav ha-shalom). We need to put more meaning into this holiday. In my opinion, Yom Ha'atzmaut should rank higher than Hanukkah, whose celebration was a pyrrhic victory (the Maccabean dynasty did not last very long).

At this writing I have just landed in Israel and I am looking forward to saying "This year in Jerusalem" at my Seder with my extended family. Jerusalem is our eternal home. I am looking forward to bringing my renewed enthusiasm for this land when I return! Shalom from Israel,

Presidents' Report

We hope everyone had a family-filled Pesach holiday. To me (Steve), the joy of a simple matzah sandwich - choroset and horseradish - or cream cheese and jelly - are special treats to be savored for a week; and then put away for another twelve months!

The world of Passover is changing - Is rice okay? What about corn syrup? It keeps reminding me that ritual and tradition are important but must always be open to "other traditions" that are equally valid.

In the beginning of April, TOLOLS shared with us the results of our February focus group. The primary themes were: fear for the immediate future; hope for our long-term future; and a feeling of homelessness. At the direction of the Board, we met with the Beth Shalom leadership and requested three actions to help make our stay there more home-like:

- 1. That we be permitted to install our sign. They agreed that the best place for the sign is under the tree by the main entrance. It may well be installed by the time you read this. Because it does not face the street, it does not require City review.
- 2. That we have access to a kitchen. Again, Beth Shalom leadership agreed, subject to review by their House Committee. If approved, we will be able to use the kitchen off the Eisner Pavilion. The kitchen has a stove and available cabinets. We may need to purchase our own refrigerator. The intention is to move the Sunday Men's Club Minyan and Brunch to the Homestead Chapel and re-introduce a hot meal!
- 3. That we install our Memorial Boards in Helfant Chapel. I am often asked: what makes a home. To me, it is two things: your family and your belongings. As a renter, we do not own tables and chairs and substantial artwork. We own Torahs, which we have already moved; and we own seven memorial boards that still hang on the wall of our old Chapel. Beth Shalom leadership agreed to allow us to move our boards as long as we do not mar (in any way) the beautiful mahogany walls of the chapel. We are currently investigating how to move the memorial boards.
- 4. *Improve the lighting in Helfant Chapel*. We are working with the maintenance staff to investigate ways to increase the brightness of the current fixtures.

We also met with Bob Schachter of the Snow Foundation concerning our request for funds to fix the gate at the cemetery. We made some minor design changes to the gate. Bob suggested we build a memorial wall near the holocaust memorial for all the plaques currently in the garage and on the gate.

Dan Rothschild has been asked to develop some preliminary ideas for the Memorial of Trees at Frick Park. The designated area is just south of the current Environmental Center location on Beechwood Boulevard.

Finally, New Light, TOLOLS and Dor Hadash were honored at the B-Pep Jazz Festival at the Heinz History Center on April 22nd. We received a standing ovation from the audience. The award "honors those who gave their lives to protect the freedom to practice their faith and the survivors who represent an extraordinary tale of resilience, courage and humanity."

Parkland to Pittsburgh: Three Days of Healing, Resilience and Community Building

Teens and adults from Parkland's Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School visited Pittsburgh on the weekend of April 5th to share their support and message of healing. The visit was made possible through the JCC's Center for Loving Kindness and Civic Engagement.

The teens were here for JServe and a BBYO convention. They also had an assembly with the students from Allderdice High School. Teens and adults met with the three congregations at a ceremony in front of the TOLOLS building, met privately with the immediate families, and were honored by the Pittsburgh Pirates. On Sunday they participated in a televised town hall meeting with survivors of the Parkland and Pittsburgh shootings plus community leaders to discuss resiliency, dealing with grief and the process of healing. The resulting broadcast *Parkland to Pittsburgh Stronger Together* is part of WTAE's station-wide initiative, Project CommUNITY, to confront the divisions in western Pennsylvania and to shine a spotlight on those bringing people together. The broadcast aired on April 9th and 14th.







B-PEP Jazz Festival Honors Three Congregations

PA General Assembly Establishes "Stronger than Hate Day"

Members of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and Senate held a rare joint session on April 10th to honor the victims of October 27th and adopted resolution 214, designating April 10th as "Stronger than Hate Day." She has an initiative called Beethoven in the Face Of Adversity. Her goal is to perform the piece 50 times over the

course of a year. Each of the fifty performances will not only include the Concerto, but engage the audience in a dialogue about overcoming challenges.
