### A Word from the Rabbi

Henri J.M. Nouwen, a well-known Dutch Catholic priest, once said, "Pay attention to the people God puts in your path if you want to discern what God is up to in your life." The people you meet in life present opportunities to learn and change. We need to constantly ask the question: why am I meeting this person now? What is this person trying to teach me by their presence? I think every High Holidays we need to make a catalog in our mind of all the people we have met in the last year – the ones we can remember of course. Sometimes the people we have the shortest encounters are the people who affect us positively or negatively. As a health care chaplain, I am constantly coming into contact with people for brief visits. We talk about their illness, their spirituality, their family, and the path on which they are walking. Many times the visit can affect me as much as it might affect them. What did the young cancer victim teach me? What did the talkative man with fear on his face teach me? What did retired travelling pastor teach me when she told me she had a crisis of faith?

The Bible is always telling us about encounters between the protagonist and others that motivate self-growth in the lead character. A Christian friend of mine told me recently that she was writing a paper on Jacob as a "trickster." I told her that Jews do not stereotype Jacob in that way. Although his mother gets him to disguise himself as Esau to get the blessing from his father, Jacob goes on to his father-in-law Lavan and learns how to navigate a manipulative bully. What is the lesson for the Jewish people? It is at the heart of the Passover Haggadah: "Lavan the Aramean tried to destroy my father Jacob, and then he and his sons went down to Egypt." Some of choices we make in life cross the path of one who is more powerful than us. Some of the choices we make in life cross the path of one who lifts us up and becomes a blessing to us.

Jewish mystics would go on to analyze the presence of the other. How do spouses complete us or not complete us? How do children bring back unfinished relationships? How gentle we need to be with those who ask for forgiveness? From the Tomer Devorah: "We do not allow positives actions, no matter how small, to be cancelled out by negative actions, no matter how large." We constantly enlarge the circle of people who may have an impact on our life. They have been sent to you to teach you about being a more spiritual person.

Encounters with others are like tests of our souls. As one pastor said to me, "We cannot give the testimony (to God's reality on earth), if you cannot pass the test."

What a beautiful thought for the coming High Holidays! We are encountering an unprecedented Holiday season. My wish is that it will be a meaningful one for your family combined with safety and good health.

### September Presidents' Report

August was consumed by two issues:

- Planning for the High Holy Days; and
- Construction of our Cemetery Chapel

### **High Holy Days**

Planning for the High Holy Days is significantly more complex this year. We have retained a Hazzanit to assist Rabbi Perlman. You can choose to attend in person in the Ballroom or via Zoom. Entrance to the Ballroom is on Shady Avenue. Please do not use the Beacon Street entrance.

During the second week of September we will be distributing Machzors, calendars, member directories, and Yizkor booklets. If you haven't already done so please let Janet know if you will pick up your books from the Cohens' front porch or whether you need them delivered.

In early August we mailed 105 surveys to members and seat holders. We received 49 responses (approximately 70 individuals). If you have not mailed your response, please do so immediately!!

Approximately 25% of responders plan to attend in-person in the Ballroom. This is well within the State-mandated guidelines for indoor gatherings. The largest number will be attending Kol Nidre Services. We have included the In-Person and Zoom Guidelines in this newsletter as a reminder.

If you change your mind about attending in-person or via Zoom, please call/email Janet at 412-512-0949 or <u>janet@newlightcongregation.org</u>. We must ensure we are below 25 individuals in the Ballroom.

A number of individuals volunteered to participate in the service with English readings. Thank you. We may be reaching out to others.

We also received a number of responses to the survey about improving the Zoom experience. The primary ones were:

- Mute everyone;
- Unison singing for selected prayers (unmute everyone);
- Short breaks in the service;
- Display the Torah and Haftorah on screen;
- Abbreviate the service where possible;
- Text based discussion instead of sermon.

We have not made a final decision but it is likely we will not erect our Succah this year. Similar to Shabbat, services for Sukkkot, Shmini Atzeret and Simchat Torah will be held in Helfant Chapel and via Zoom.

# **Cemetery Construction**

Construction of the Chapel at the cemetery has begun. Completion of the building is expected by late September/early October.

### **GUIDELINES FOR ATTENDING 2020 NEW LIGHT CONGREGATION HIGH HOLIDAY SERVICES**

### VIA ZOOM

(see reverse for in-person in ballroom attendance guidelines)

### **BEFOREHAND:**

- You must be registered to receive the Zoom connection info. We will contact everyone who plans to attend as we get closer to Rosh Hashanah. If we have not contacted you or you have changed your mind since the last contact, please register via email: janet@newlightcongregation.org or call 412-512-0949.
- We will use the same connection for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.
- If you have not used Zoom before it's a good idea to test it beforehand. Contact Steve Cohen if you'd like to set up a testing time.
- Learn how to mute and unmute yourself. If you are connected on a computer, tablet or smartphone use the Audio controls on the screen. You can also hold down the spacebar if you want to just briefly mute or unmute yourself. If you are connected on a stupid phone, press \*6 to mute or unmute.

### **ZOOM ETIQUETTE:**

- Don't be late. The service will be shorter than usual about 2 ½ hours for mornings, 1 hour for Neilah.
- Sit still as much as possible. Everyone can be seen and movements are distracting. If you don't want to be seen, turn off your video.
- Do not eat on camera.
- Stay muted until appropriate times to unmute yourself. When you are not muted everyone
  can hear you including ringing phones, doorbells, side conversations, toilets flushing, and
  other background noise.
- Don't muti-task. Observe the same decorum as if you were in a synagogue.

### GUIDELINES FOR ATTENDING 2020 NEW LIGHT CONGREGATION HIGH HOLIDAY SERVICES

# IN THE BALLROOM AT BETH SHALOM (see reverse for Zoom attendance guidelines)

### **PRIOR TO ATTENDING:**

- You must be registered in order to enter the building. We will contact everyone who plans to attend as we get closer to Rosh Hashanah. If we have not contacted you or you have changed your mind since the last contact, please register via email: janet@newlightcongregation.org or call 412-512-0949.
- You will not be admitted to the building if you have a temperature greater than
  - 100.4<sup>0</sup>. Please also do not attend if you
    - o are unwell, or
    - o a member of your household is ill, or
    - o you suspect you have been exposed to Covid.

### WHEN YOU ARRIVE (Beth Shalom Entrance Rules):

- Enter at the Shady Ave entrance. There will be no valet parking this year; you can park in the lot or on the street.
- Upon entering the building, non-Jewish personnel will take your temperature with a thermal thermometer.

### WHILE IN THE BUILDING:

- Drinking fountains in the building are turned off. Bring your own bottle of water to hydrate, if needed.
- Masks are required for everyone over eight years old. Please bring your own mask. It is
  recommended that each person bring two masks because singing can cause the mask to
  become wet. New Light will have some gloves and extra masks available.
- Maintain a distance of 6' or more between people, even with masks. (Families may sit together.)
- Use the rest rooms at the Shady Ave entrance or outside the main entrance to the Ballroom (up the steps).

### While in the Ballroom:

- Bring your own tallit and machzor. We will loan books to keep at home and bring with you
  for each Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur service. If you did not receive a machzor you may
  get one in the ballroom. Take it home and bring it with you each day.
- There will be no food after services.
