# A Word from the Rabbi

Dear friends,

What bothers me most about American mass shootings is the ones that target school children. Columbine, Newtown, Parkland, Uvalde, and countless other massacres at schools have all been followed by the same infuriating and callous inaction. Military-style high powered firearms are still not banned or regulated in our country. We want change; we need change. So how is change going to come about? After Buffalo and Highland Park, Illinois, it is no longer outrageous. It is horrifying. There can be, in fact, a compulsion to make one's voice loudly heard, even when a grievous and murderous wrong has proven itself to be incorrigible and impervious to all moral argument, thus dashing all hope for change and repair. My teacher Rabbi Gordon Tucker asks us to consider the prophet Jeremiah whom we read in the three weeks before Tisha B'av: "Jeremiah had no real hope for the moral dystopia that he experienced in ancient Judea. And yet, even though he had no expectation of being able to move the needle, still he cried out in utter despair."

"Why would one scream into the wind in that way? Abraham Joshua Heschel memorably described Jeremiah's voice (like that of other prophets) as being "one octave too high." What gave it that shrillness and that urgency, even given the futility of any expectation of righting the wrongs? Heschel's insight was both startling and profound: he argued that the special aptitude of the prophets was not an ability to predict the future, but rather the deep intuitive sense they had of the devastating effect that earthly injustice has on God's inner emotional life. As he put it, whoever imagines that God is unaffected by injustice by and to humans, is denying the very essence of religious faith. In this view, what caused prophets to shriek was a shattering and undeniable empathy with the suffering of the Creator. Such profound empathy is always one of the signs that a professed love of another is real love. If that is true of love between human beings, all the more so must it be true of a love of God."

When Tisha B'Av comes in the calendar, we are alert to our national day of mourning that goes beyond the horror of the destruction of the Jerusalem Temple. How could a place of peace and such sanctity crumble to the fire and strikes of the enemy? In the days following the destruction in 70 CE (through the Jewish War of 132 to 135 CE), many Jewish lives were lost, murdered by the Roman armies. It was a Holocaust of its own with more than 580,000 Jews killed. In their day they called it "the Hurban" ("utter destruction"). The name of Jerusalem was changed to Aelia Capitolina and Jews were banned from ever settling the holy basin ever again.

On this day of mourning, I mourn for God and think of Jeremiah. We must think of the children and not shirk our responsibility as Jews to bring love to our world.

During July New Light hosted a three part lecture series, "Pittsburgh is Our Home". There were over 40 attendees in person and on zoom for each of the lectures. Irrelevant but interesting facts: When a shul was named "shalom", it often meant that two factions had settled their disputes and were now joined together "in peace"; and that said disputes were no different in the early twentieth century compared to today: ritual observance vs assimilation. Or, that the owner of the Pirates, Barney Dreyfuss, got his start distilling bourbon in Louisville and got into baseball as a hobby. His biggest nemesis once he bought the Pirates was .... City Hall! Pirates tickets (and jobs) were viewed as patronage plums by the Republican administration that ran the city! Or that Sophie Masloff, the accidental mayor, was actually hand-picked by Richard Caliguiri to succeed him?

As the series was well received, we hope to have a new set of lectures in November, after the holidays.

We continue to make progress at the Memorial Chapel at the cemetery. The original contractor has agreed (and paid us) for the cost of replacing the HVAC system. By the time you read this the new system should be installed and running smoothly. The inside memorial items are also making progress. We visited Hunt Studios and saw the full scale art for the door and window and helped pick out pieces of colored glass to be used. We also visited the contractor who is building the history wall. Both the wall and stained glass should be installed well before Rosh Hashanah. We are beginning to make tentative plans for an official opening in October.

Look to your mail in the next two weeks for complete High Holy Day information. Like last year, it will be in-person and on zoom. As a reminder, our COVID policy is "mask optional." See you all at the picnic under the tent in the parking lot on Sunday, August 28 at 5PM!

#### **MEMORIALIZATION WORKING GROUP AND TOLI UPDATE**

The MWG has been working on the creation of the new 501c3. The new entity, named the 10.27 Memorial, Inc. has been approved by the state of Pennsylvania. Next steps include developing the board structure, the by-laws, and the request for non-profit status.

Libeskind Studios is planning to meet with the MWG in early September to discuss initial design ideas. They will be joined by James Young, author of "Stages of Memory: Reflections on Memorial Art, Loss, and the Spaces Between," who was involved with the development of the World Trade Center Memorial and Museum.

TOLI has been focused on the essential details - tasks like implementing a donor management system, selecting a payroll provider, purchasing insurance. They plan to hire a lobbying firm to help obtain government and foundation funding. A preliminary first year operating budget was recently approved. They are also expecting to hire a consulting group to build a master implementation plan for the museum. Everyone is very excited by the caliber of the group identified. The job posting for a CEO has received strong interest and initial interviews are planned for late August/early September.

This year Tisha B'Av, commemorating the destruction of both Temples, begins immediately after Shabbat, the evening of August 6. The evening community observance (Ma'ariv and Eykhah) will be hosted by Temple Sinai this year.

The fast begins at 8:29 p.m. Ma'ariv will be at 9:00 p.m., at Temple Sinai, 5505 Forbes Avenue, 15217, followed immediately by the Tisha B'Av service, including the Book of Lamentations (Eykhah).

On Sunday, August 7, Beth Shalom will hold services at 8:00 AM and 7:00 P.M. At these services they do not use tallitot or tefillin.
