The Flashlight

July is a difficult month to preach positive sermons. Coming up with summer fun sermons based on the Book of Numbers is hard because the content is all about betrayal, punishment, suspicion, divisiveness, anger, power plays, control, and unreasonable complaints. Everybody is a target for anger. Nobody seems to trust each other. God is not even excluded from distrust.



I always felt sorry for Jewish educators at summer camps. What do they do when they want to teach the Torah portion of the week and the principal lesson is one of negativity? Miriam and Aaron gossip about Moses. The people complain about the manna and say the food was better in Egypt. Tribal leaders sabotage Moses' and God's plans to move forward into the Promised Land. Cousin Korach accuses Moses of nepotism in appointing Aaron as the HIgh Priest. The list goes on. Plus, the main holiday of the summer is the dismal retelling of the destruction of the Temple and the two exiles the Jews had to contend with based on their misbehavior and sins. How can kids have any fun on Shabbat or during the week when bitterness is all around?

This month Beth and I will visit Camp Stone, a B'nai Akiva-Zionist camp, up in the northern Pennsylvania woods. Camp Stone has been a favored camp of Yael and Ada. I have lost track of the number of summers they enjoyed at this informal-educational centered camp that makes Judaism fun. Ada is on staff this summer leading the wilderness adventure part of the camp (Machal). It is supposed to be akin to boot camp in the army. What joy! I wish I was a kid again.

But back to the negative Torah lessons. Jewish education is pitched at different levels of understanding. A good educator knows that the staff are also included in an activity that can produce a good spiritual outcome for their age level. Teens and college students are at the age where introspection is important. The dark stories of the Torah can bring to mind emotions and ethical questions that young adults struggle with. This is part of the total camp experience.

We adults read these moral tales on yet another level. No matter how negative, there is a part of us that smiles when the silver lining of a rebellion is revealed or when the irony of the Torah's language is exposed. The authors of the midrashim and the commentaries compete with one another for the interpretation that gets at the spiritual or emotional truths of the matter. For example, I have come to read the story of the exodus through the lens of developmental psychology. The Egyptians beat the hides of the Israelite slaves and the Israelites escaped like wounded children. In little over a year, the Israelites create a golden calf, complain about the manna, complain about the yoke of the commandments, and complain for no reason at all. Simply put, they remained children. The Author of the stories hands us the flashlight and invites us to look at the darker part of our repressed childhood selves. Weren't we the ones in the back seat on a car trip that kvetched: "Mom, Dad, Are we there yet?"

I invite you to shul on Shabbat morning in July to delve into the darker parts of the Torah. Free will was given as a necessary gift to Adam and Eve when they are from the tree of knowledge. That free will remains, as the Children of Israel find their bearings in the wilderness. Join us on their journey!

TREE OF LIFE GROUNDBREAKING

On Sunday, June 23, 2024, Tree of Life Inc. held a groundbreaking ceremony for the new, reimagined building. In the immediate aftermath of October 27, there was consensus in the community that the Tree of Life Congregation must rebuild their building. But the vision of the Tree of Life went far beyond simply renovating their sanctuary, school and social hall. They saw as their obligation the need to create a response to the hate filled antisemitic rantings of the shooter; as well as to teach and educate about the history of antisemitism in America. Only by exposing the underpinnings of this hate can future generations be "stronger than hate."

Creating a first-of-its-kind museum in America requires a national (if not world-wide) campaign. And under the leadership of Michael Bernstein and Carole Zawatsky, they have created just such a national effort. In attendance at the groundbreaking was a long list of national political leaders. Both Second Gentleman, Douglas Emhoff and Pennsylvania Governor Josh Shapiro spoke of the rise of antisemitism in America and the need to combat hate. Others in attendance included Senators Bob Casey, Mayor Ed Gainey and many Allegheny County and Pittsburgh local leaders. Still others, including Senator John Fetterman, were featured in a video.



Erik Ward, activist, author, Western State's Executive Director, Senior Fellow of Southern Poverty Law Center and Race Forward, and member of the Tree of Life Academic Advisory Committee made perhaps the most provocative statement when he rose to equate anti-Semitism with racism. Jews, he noted, are often considered a separate "race;" therefore, hatred of Jews is the ultimate form of racism. His words were of compassion and a true understanding of hatred, racism and antisemitism.

Just as a wedding ends with the breaking of a wine glass, the groundbreaking ended with the families of the victims, survivors and everyone directly impacted gathering on stage to break replica glass houses which will be used to create specially crafted mezzuzot to grace the doors of the building.

The building is scheduled to open by Hanukkah, 2026.
