The Flashlight

Pesach greetings to you and your family! Inside this month's newsletter, there are guidelines for having a kosher holiday. This year's Pesach begins on Saturday night, April 12. This happens approximately every nine years. This means that erev Pesach, the day before <u>Passover</u>, coincides with Shabbat, bringing with it a number of unique laws and guidelines.



FAST OF THE FIRSTBORN

It is an ancient tradition for the firstborns to fast on the day before Passover. Since we (generally) do not fast on Shabbat, which is a day of feasting, or on Friday which may interfere with our Shabbat joy, this fast is observed on Thursday, 12 Nissan. The widespread custom is for firstborns to participate in a siyum or another celebratory event that overrides the fast and allows them to eat for the remainder of the day. This, too, is done on Thursday.

SEARCH FOR CHAMETZ

On the night before Passover we search for <u>chametz</u> (which we are forbidden to own or eat on Passover) by candlelight. Since this cannot be done on Friday night, which is Shabbat, we do it after nightfall on Thursday.

DESTROYING CHAMETZ

The last bits of chametz must be burned the day before Passover, at 10:00 AM. Since this cannot be done on Shabbat, the burning of the chametz takes place at the same time on Friday, even though we keep just enough chametz to eat at the Friday night and Shabbat morning meals.

THE SALE OF CHAMETZ

All chametz that we wish to save for use after Passover must be sold to a non-Jew and then repurchased after the holiday has passed. This sale typically takes place on the morning before Passover. Since buying and selling are forbidden on Shabbat, the sale is transacted (by the community rabbi on behalf of his community) on Friday.

EATING CHAMETZ ON SHABBAT

Since the house cannot be cleaned on Shabbat, all the cleaning must be finished on Friday. Yet it is a mitzvah to eat bread at the Friday night and Shabbat morning meals. What do we do?

It is also forbidden to eat matzah at this time, in order that we enjoy it on Passover eve with gusto. (It is possible to eat kosher-for-Passover egg <u>matzah</u>, since one may not use this matzah for the seder. According to Ashkenazi custom, all healthy people must finish eating egg matzah before the latest time to eat chametz, like bread at 10:00 AM).

One custom is to prepare small rolls, one per meal for each participant, which can be distributed and eaten without the use of a knife. There is a custom to use Egg Matzah instead of bread for

these meals since Egg Matzah is not truly matzah.

Make sure that you eat all the chametz that has been left for Shabbat before the deadline, as chametz cannot be sold, burned, or taken out to the street on Shabbat. Any remaining challah pieces and crumbs should be flushed down the toilet. At this point, we say the second Kol Chamira declaration, disowning any leftover chametz.

A second approach follows Rabbi Moshe Feinstein who declared:

It is good for those who do not wish to leave hametz [in their house] on Shabbat out of concern for possible obstacles that may arise from this, to fulfill the mitzvah of the two Shabbat meals using egg matzah... (Rabbi Moshe Feinstein, p. 274).

He cites the words of the Beit Yosef and explains:

We have seen that it would be appropriate to enact and institute the practice of destroying all hametz before Shabbat... and to fulfill the mitzvah of the Shabbat meals using egg matzah... and therefore those who are able and want to take the trouble to bake egg matzah for the two Shabbat meals — that is preferable...

The Conservative movement follows the second custom as written by Rabbi David Golinkin. We may have to start our Passover preparations earlier this year and the Shabbat before Pesach, April 12fh, becomes a virtual ninth day of the holiday.

I pray that your Passover is meaningful for you and your family this year!

We had a lovely, entertaining and well attended Purim Celebration in mid-March. Barbara Caplan and Janet Cohen attended the Tree of Life, Inc. launch of a Traveling Exhibition "Lessons from the Tree of Life: Lighting the Path Forward," of artwork and artifacts donated after October 27th. The items, now held by the Rauh Jewish History Program & Archives at the Heinz History Center, will travel to Cleveland, New York and Miami after its Pittsburgh run through April 25. The new traveling exhibition opens at The University Club Library at the University of Pittsburgh on March 27.

The Exhibit has four sections:

- What happened on 10/27
- Community response
- Re-imagining Tree of Life
- Antisemitism in America

Speakers included Carole Zawatsky, Michael Bernstein, Maggie Feinstein, Eric Lidji and Rabbi Myers. Eric Lidji discussed the challenge of managing the items in the collection – the dichotomy of people wanting to share these acts of support widely, while also holding them close because they are so precious. He made a point about how these items ignore divisions of religion, race, ethnicity, regions, politics – they were from everywhere and everyone, acts of love and support.

Eric also mentioned the specific items in the exhibit will change as it moves from city to city — there are 10 items, displayed and possibly hundreds of thousands to choose from. Some members of the community might travel with the exhibit because they have a strong urge to share what the items mean to them. Barbara was especially moved by a picture of a multitude of people standing outside in the rain, under umbrellas, expressing their care and support.

In conjunction with the exhibit, Tree of Life will present "Songs of Resilience: Music for Lighting the Path Forward," a concert of hope and remembrance featuring six cantors presenting traditional and contemporary Jewish music. The April 3 performance will take place at the Heinz History Center and feature Tree of Life Rabbi and Cantor Jeffrey Myers; Temple Sinai Cantor David Reinwald; Cantor Emerita at B'nai Abraham of Butler County Michal Gray-Schaffer; Parkway Jewish Center Cantor Laura Berman; Cantor Emeritus at United Hebrew Congregation

in St. Louis Ronald Eichaker; and Temple Emanuel Cantor Kalix Jacobson, who coordinated the concert, selecting both the performers and songs.

If possible, all Chametz – food not acceptable during Pesach (Passover), or materials containing such unacceptable food –should be destroyed or given away before the holiday begins. Should this be impossible, the Chametz may be stored in such a way that we are sure not to use it during the holiday and its actual ownership is transferred to a non-Jew until the holiday ends.
